I am pleased to announce our police department went through its sixth national accreditation assessment and had what was believed to be an excellent review. I would like to thank all staff involved, especially Kim Shupert, our Accreditation Manager.

During our process we had to meet 464 standards, of which close to 1500 documents were reviewed. Several meetings took place with staff from each facet of the Police Department, from myself all the way down to the newest patrolmen. I am proud of the fact that during our exit interview with the inspectors, they made the comment that it was evident there is good communication throughout the department, stating further that it appeared to them everyone understands and knows the mission and vision of the Police Department and have been bought-in to the team concept to accomplish this.

We are currently working on and have prepared our 2012 budget and will be submitting it to the Police Commission the Week of May 30th at an Executive Session for their review and future approval.

Included with this report are several events that took place in the last month that are indicated in the Uniform and Support Divisions' reports.



Investigations


Investigations remains somewhat slow; which essentially means serious or complex crime is down. The division is continuing to focus on training and recently detectives have been encouraged to start working on the road during slow times to assure they can still perform at the level of a road officer and assist when needed. This will also help to maintain communication between the two divisions.

Lieutenant Campbell and Officer Gill attended a 3 day class on Internal Affairs. This is a course that has not been attended in awhile but is beneficial to the department. Sgt. Pyatt attended her final Police Executive Leadership Academy (PELA) module. She is the fourth member of the department to complete this training including Captain Bullock, Sergeant Summers and myself.




Major Grimes is scheduled to complete PELA by the end of the year and Lieutenant Campbell will start the class in July. The goal of the department is to send all sergeants and above, that supervise officers, to this course.

There were no arrests made in investigations last month but Officer Fults cleared a case involving two juvenile females that vandalized our public library. The library has requested that charges not be filed because of an agreement between the parents of the children and the library to exchange charges for community service work at the library.

The United Drug Task Force had nine cases in April with eight of those being controlled buys. The ATF and UDTF had one case where they bought a weapon. They also identified a prescription drug dealer in Danville.

Nearly a year ago, the department made a somewhat controversial decision to reassign a civilian, Belinda Sharkey, to the duty of Property and Evidence Custodian. This position has traditionally been filled by a sworn officer and personnel were uncertain at the time if this change was for the best. However, it has been proven extremely successful and the department has been pleased with the way the property room has been organized. A detailed report from Belinda showing the contents of the property room is in your packet. Currently the property room has 3,786 pieces of property.



Records & Accreditation

Throughout the month of April, Kimberly Shupert and other Records personnel made absolute final preparations for the CALEA on-site that commenced on April 30th. Several conversations and emails between Kimberly and lead Assessor Bill Pease from Nashua Police Department in New Hampshire took place. Results of the 300 mail-off files continued to be very positive and only 1 issue was identified in the wording of a small portion of policy regarding the reporting of Use of Force. This omission was

immediately addressed and to the full satisfaction of the assessors. Final results of the on-site will be reported in the May support services report.

Also in April, part-time Records employee Brenda Habermehl was offered and accepted full-time employment with the department. Brenda's full-time start date is May 16th. The department is very fortunate to have Brenda back in its employee and Kim Shupert looks forward to working with her again.

Employees plan to resume the training program by I.U.P.U.I designed to obtain the Microsoft Office Certificate during the month of May. Our goal is to have all members in records Microsoft Certified. Kim Shupert will also resume obtaining her Leadership program certificate.

Community Relations

Sergeant Fleck worked closely with Kim Shupert this month to re-create an improved marketing plan for his RUOK and Youth Camp programs and services. The department now has professional and eye-catching brochures along with large matching display poster boards for these programs. Program applications can now be downloaded from the department website at www.brownsburgpolice.org. The department is planning in the future to have all applications submittable from the website to make it as easy as possible to register for any of our programs.

The department is quite pleased with what Sgt. Fleck has done to improve the department's interaction with the public. As evident from the Public Service Activity report in the Commission packets, Sgt. Fleck has created several new and exciting programs. He is also getting large groups of people to attend these presentations. He presented ten unique courses effecting 334 citizens last month. Sgt. Fleck appears to be a very passionate and proactive Community Relations Resource with both the department and Brownsburg citizens benefitting from his extensive efforts.

Public Information


The department had 6 media contacts during the month of April. These contacts covered follow-up media requests in regards to the "R U OK" Program, Corporal Pyatt's award for designing our new patch and the Accreditation On-Site press release. We also released nine Facebook posts and six tweets on our Twitter Page. There are also several older news stories now visible on the website.

Purchasing

As of May 4th, 2011, the department as expended 32.91% of its budget. The department is right on target, even slightly under budget and very comfortable with our position at this time.

Chris Wingler has been preparing budget numbers for the town and the department plans to work together to create a budget booklet similar to last years.

Quartermaster Wingler has also been busy with outfitting our four newest officers.



Information Technology

The new website was officially launched on May 2nd. Although it took much longer than ever expected, the department is extremely pleased with the outcome and has received comments regarding the ease of gathering information. There are still several things left to do on the website such as adding additional photos and electronically submittable forms which the department plans to deploy in the coming weeks.

The department continues working with Lincware to put in place our document packages for the public first. The forms will be used by the public on our website and submitted to Laserfiche. Laserfiche will then be programmed to use a workflow to process and notify the staff. Some of the forms will be requests for extra patrols, traffic escort requests and vacation checks. Also all of our applications for employment and programs will be available the same manner.

The second part of the Lincware project is to simplify the paperwork process for the road officers. This is going to limit the amount of double entry of case data and also make the process completely electronic.

As stated before, the Lincware project is rather large. We have set a tentative goal of having this project completed by September 2011. Kim Shupert and Brenda Habermehl will be working together to accomplish this project.

The department has also recently purchased and deployed netbooks to the detectives as take home computers and mobile data terminals. Detectives can now use their computers anywhere and have access to case and drivers license information.

On April 12, 2011 the official department Twitter page was launched. Most of the information on Twitter will be the same as the information on Facebook, but reaching different subscribers.

Human Resources

Sergeant Wells injured his leg and hip last month; but did not miss any work as a result. The injury occurred while getting out of his vehicle to direct traffic. I have begun to look for an additional Human Resources class to attend. Although I have had some training in this area I believe more is needed. The Town has primary personnel in place to handle issues at a higher level. However, it is important to have better knowledge in this area at the department level.


APRIL 2011 OPERATIONS REPORT

The following information contained within this report summarizes information deemed pertinent for dissemination from Major Joseph Grimes, Chief of Operations.

ENFORCEMENT:

During the Month of April, the officers of the Enforcement Division worked a total of 3924 hours, with 212 of those hours being completed by Probationary Officers currently in the Field Training Program (FTO). While 145 hours of the total hours worked were completed by Reserve Officers not in the FTO program, and 255 hours of the total hours were worked by Interdiction Officers.

CALEA assessors were at the Brownsburg Police Department from Saturday April 30th – May 3rd. Material was handed out on topics for the shifts to conduct Roll Call training for review prior to assessment. It was important to be very familiar with these topics as the assessors were riding with patrol officers and may be inquiring on some of these topics. Assessors reviewed our Roll Call Training log to ensure compliance.

Shift personnel ensured that the squad room and workroom were presentable for CALEA assessors; however, a huge contributor to ensuring that this task was accomplished was Kellie Stewart that took it upon herself to clean the squad room, work center, Capt. Bullock, and Major Grimes' work areas.

CALEA Staff was very impressed and complimentary of the Officer's professionalism and clear and concise answers to their inquiries. Assessors were extremely impressed with each of the Officers' conduct during the assessment, and wished to note how well Capt. Pat Bullock and Training Coordinator, Cpl. Andy Watts, performed during the Static Display, Tours, and Interviews with the Assessors.

On April 11, 2011 at approximately 2236 hours, Cpl. Doug Abshire observed a truck in his review mirror traveling extremely close. Dispatch then put out a broadcast of a possible intoxicated driver traveling southbound on S.R. 267 driving a truck that matched the description of the truck behind him. Abshire pulled over and the truck went past him. Abshire activated his emergency lights and pulled out behind the vehicle, a white Ford pickup. The vehicle continued south, Abshire activated his siren and the vehicle still continued south. Major Grimes which was the closest unit to the pursuit as he was driving home from E.R.T. training caught up with the pursuit with his lights and siren activated as well. The suspect continued to speed up and slow down while attempting to evade police. At S.R. 267 and C.R. 200 N. Deputy Jason Woods deployed stops sticks. The device flattened three of the tires on the fleeing vehicle. A high risk stop was conducted near S.R. 267 and C.R. 100 N, and after multiple commands to exit the vehicle, Susan Trout exited the passenger side. It appeared she was extremely intoxicated and refused a PBT at the scene. Later, Bruce Plott, exited the driver's side of the truck. Both subjects were taken into custody for alcohol related offenses and resisting law enforcement.

INTERDICTION:

In the month of April, I.C.E. Team members made a total of 2 arrests, including an individual involved in the manufacturing of methamphetamine. This individual was in charge of a small crew that would travel central Indiana purchasing ephedrine from local pharmacies. The preferred pharmacy in central Indiana has become the Brownsburg Wal-Mart. This crew was no different. Officers stopped them leaving the Brownsburg Wal-Mart on I-74. Officers arrested the driver, who also was a Habitual Traffic Violator for Life never allowed to operate a vehicle, for the possession of more than 23 grams of pure ephedrine, the key ingredient used to manufacture meth. Also during the stop, officers gleaned information from the vehicle that leads back to several large scale methamphetamine cooks throughout the State of Indiana. These names have been given to the Indiana State Police for further investigation.

I.C.E. Team Members also assisted in the apprehension of a man that had fled officers on a traffic stop. Officer Maples was able to utilize K-9 Cato to successfully and safely apprehend the fleeing felon. This was Cato's third physical apprehension and is becoming a reliable street patrol dog. This may have been the best and safest outcome for the arrest as it was later learned that the individual dislikes and distrusts cops, and is typically well armed and has made certain threats against law enforcement.

I.C.E. Team Members look forward to dryer weather in upcoming months, as the last 2 months productivity has been hampered by constant downpours.

MOTORCYCLE:

The motorcycles finally got out full-time on the roadway during the Month of April. The weather has not been real cooperative with motorcycle patrol for the last 8 weeks. Officer Dan

Rooker went to his basic motorcycle operations school in Evansville, IN from April 4th –April 15th. Officer Rooker scored a 99% on his overall test out. Cpl. Tony West was very impressed with his riding ability upon observing Officer Rooker on the course. Cpl. West rode down to Evansville on April 12th for his annual recertification. Cpl. West stayed with Officer Rooker for his team ride, which is held on the last day of training. Officer Rooker attended this school with two Hendricks County Sheriff's Deputies who will be working with the Brownsburg Motorcycle Officers on escort details throughout the summer. Both deputies will be attending the Brownsburg Police Department monthly training starting in May.

Hopefully for the Month of May the Motorcycle Officers will be able to be more visible on the roadway with good weather. Cpl. West has already been starting to receive phone calls about motorcycle escorts throughout the summer. The unit is in great shape and ready to get into the riding season.

Capt. Pat Bullock was presented a plaque in memory of K-9 Kai that had succumbed to an illness during the Month of April 2011. Capt. Bullock was the handler of Kai from 2001 until 2005 when Officer John Maples became Kai's handler. Kai was retired into the care of Capt. Bullock in September of 2008.

BICYCLE:

After careful consideration, Cpl. Andy Watts made notification congratulating the following officers for having been selected to be added to the Brownsburg Police Bicycle Unit in order to fill existing vacancies, effective May 1st, 2011:

- Ofc. Nate Schmidt

Officers were selected based upon criteria set forth by policy and through the Office of Chief and Majors. Special consideration was given to the Community Resource position and therefore a waiver of the Sergeant rank was administered.

Bicycle Unit Officers conducted a meeting on Tuesday April 19th at 1400 hrs at the Brownsburg Training Facility, and included the newly selected personnel in preparation of the May 1st effective date. At the meeting, sizing for equipment and uniforms were conducted, and discussion took place to give direction on the goals/objectives of the unit during the riding season. The bike unit will be attending their annual certification for riders on May 16-17th in Plainfield. All riders are looking forward to getting the season started and planning several tactical rides in the coming months.

ERT:

Brownsburg Emergency Response Team (E.R.T.) conducted their monthly training on April 11th. Training included many principles in utilizing the Glock handgun while performing qualifications, breaching, cover/contact, Negative targets, room clearing, and Glock SIMS gun scenario based training. Each of the members of the E.R.T., including our newest member as a Medic, have continued to show dedication to the specialty through regular attendance and active participation through rigorous eleven hour training days.

HONOR GUARD:

While the Month of April posed no opportunities for the Brownsburg Honor Guard to perform any special details, Sgt. Pete Fleck held a monthly training date in preparation for up and coming events. Sgt. Fleck is currently coordinating with local and county entities on scheduling personnel from the Brownsburg Honor Guard for a ceremony in Danville and the Brownsburg 4th of July Parade, in addition to possible presenting of the colors at sporting events.

RESERVES:

During the Month of April, Officer Jeremiah Boswell successfully completed and graduated the FTO program on April 12th, and was released for Solo Patrol. Reserve Officer Jeff Furgeson submitted a letter resigning from the Brownsburg Police Department Reserve Division. In addition, Cpl. Bill Levy has also submitted his letter of resignation (See Attach) from the Reserve Division due to an out of state job opportunity. Cpl. Levy last day with our agency will be May 27th. There currently are still three persons in the Brownsburg Police Department Reserve Academy class that intend on becoming members of the Brownsburg Reserve Division upon their graduation.

Events worked in April by Reserve Division Officers included:

- Prisoner Transport – weekly update
- Prescription drug drop off- April 2nd
- Legion Riders event – April 9th
- Easter Egg Hunt –April 23rd
 - Manpower provided for event at Arbuckle Acres Easter Egg Hunt were completely overwhelmed
 - Too much traffic for personnel assigned causing manpower to be utilized from the road
 - There was a 2nd Easter egg hunt permitted at Williams Park that Brownsburg Police were not advised of on the same day of the Arbuckle Acres event which contributed to the excessive traffic
 - Williams Park had Little League pictures being conducted as well during the same time as the Easter Egg Hunt
 - According to shift supervisor, there were dangerous and hazardous conditions existing, especially for the children due to vehicle traffic movement in the parks.

Officers working traffic had to shut down inbound and outbound traffic and begin looking for lost children.

- **Measures and communication have already taken place for planning of a more organized event between Police and Park personnel**
- 10k run hosted by BCSC
 - 4 Reserves assisted with two (2) days notification.

TRAINING:

April 12, 2011, Captain Perry Hollowell from the Indiana Law Enforcement Training Board sent a letter congratulating Corporal Andy Watts. The letter indicated that Cpl. Watts had been selected as a perspective candidate for the Master Instructor Program by the Master Instructor Committee, and that an interview was set for May 6, 2011. There are currently 64 Master Instructors in Indiana, and 5 (including Cpl. Watts) working toward the certification.

April Training for the Brownsburg Police Department began with a Central Indiana Law Enforcement Training Counsel sponsored event at the Brownsburg Training Facility on April 4th. The training held was a Standardized Field Sobriety Tests Refresher. This refresher allowed officers the opportunity to have a classroom portion followed by actual hands on utilizing the learned techniques on intoxicated volunteers. The critiques provided by attendees for this refresher course were very good.

The entire department conducted their CPR/First Aid refresher throughout the beginning of April. This training was completed at the Brownsburg Fire Territory Headquarters and instructed by Brownsburg Fire Territory at no cost to the Brownsburg Police Department. Brownsburg E.R.T. utilized the classroom and the range on April 11th for their monthly training. On April 12th Chris Winger organized a Radar/In-car Video system demonstration at the Brownsburg Training Facility by David Lowry of Enforcement Products. The event was well attended by 8 different agencies. April 14th Officer O'Brien requested and received additional firearms training. Hendricks County Juvenile Probation conducted firearms practice on April 15th at the Brownsburg range. On April 19th Brownsburg Bicycle Patrol met at the training facility to plan and strategize for the upcoming riding season. April 21st the Central Indiana Law Enforcement Training Counsel (CILETC) met at the Brownsburg Training Facility for their monthly meeting. In addition, on the same day the Hendricks County Chiefs meeting was hosted by Brownsburg at the Training Facility. Both of these events were well attended. Officer O'Brien requested and received additional firearms training on April 21st.

April 26-27th the Brownsburg Police Department hosted the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center-Rural Policing Institute (FLETC-RPI) Use of Force Instructor-Refresher. Over 56 instructors from 40 agencies were present for this training session. The instructor advised that he was very pleased with the hosting for the class and that he "rarely fills this class this quickly". The instructor further advised that he would like to utilize Brownsburg to host on a quarterly basis. This would not only allow Brownsburg to publicize the facility, but would grant us free seats in any class we host. FLETC provided Cpl. Andy Watts and Brownsburg Police Department certificates of appreciation.

Finally, the 2011 Brownsburg Police Department Reserve Academy continues meeting every Tuesday and Thursday evening from 6p-10p and every other Saturday. Currently the students are completing the Criminal Law portion of the academy and moving into the traffic law block of instruction.



COURT

In April, the Brownsburg Town Court decided to decrease the fines associated with most traffic violations. As of May 1, the majority of the fines and costs will be set at \$135. Also, the court now has an online payment option. New waiver forms have been distributed to Brownsburg Police that reflects the changes.

Beginning Wednesday, June 1st, Brownsburg Town Court will be holding traffic court one evening per month. This night court option will be available for traffic tickets only; criminal cases will all remain set during the afternoon session. Night court will be held the first Wednesday of every month beginning at 6 pm. All officers will be defaulted to the traditional afternoon court schedule; however, if officers prefer to have their traffic cases set in the evening, they need to contact the court and specify that. Due to this option there will now be three State Troopers who will once again start using the Brownsburg Court since they can catch court at night now and not alter their schedules.
