Town Council Members,

You will find attached with this report two additional reports; one from the Chief of Operations Division, the other from the Chief of Support Division. Contained within those reports you will see once again that the Brownsburg Police Department was extremely busy in its activities. Just a brief highlight of activities that took place:

- Provided security for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Extravaganza in the park. Also provided traffic control for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade.
- The department exceeded 100 arrests for the fourth straight month, again indicating an increase in this category.
- Corporal Ben Pyatt received additional training in Texas. This was a ten-day course of which Corporal Pyatt was requested to attend by the U.S. Department of Transportation. All costs for this class were provided for by the U.S. Department of Transportation. Corporal Pyatt will now be certified to provide training for other agencies; such as the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the D.E.A., and other departments throughout the country. While in Texas Corporal Pyatt also spent time

with the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol obtaining hands-on training in observation techniques.

- Myself, along with Police Commissioners Ray Kotarski and Allan Bolante, and Accreditation Manager Kim Shupert went through the final accreditation process in Cincinnati, Ohio July 30<sup>th</sup>. Contained with this report are the results of that assessment provided in letter-form by Commissioners Kotarski and Bolante.

It is our pleasure and honor to inform the Town Council here in Brownsburg, Indiana that our Brownsburg Police Department, both sworn and civilian staff, are now known as the “crown jewel” of public safety in the United States and Canada.

On July 30, 2011 at Cincinnati, Ohio we attended the C.A.L.E.A. (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) Conference where we witnessed the interviewing process of 13 police departments. Some of these were Mobile, Alabama, Fresno, California, Normal, Illinois, Carmel, Indiana, and Schererville, Indiana. Chief Dove could not anticipate questions that he might be asked. The questions were all different. We did witness the answers that conveyed his passion and dedication to the Town of Brownsburg and the Brownsburg Police Department.

The Brownsburg Police Department was told that they met the requirements of a highly regarded and broadly recognized body of law enforcement accreditation standards. This is the Brownsburg Police Department’s sixth accreditation process. C.A.L.E.A. then announced that they were awarding the Brownsburg Police Department not only the Meritorious Award, but the Accreditation with Excellence Award. They also added that the Brownsburg Police Department has demonstrated a commitment to professional standards in policy and practice.

The Brownsburg Police Commission is proud of our agency’s accomplishments, and we commend them because they are the gold standard for public safety.




### Investigations

Arrests continued to remain steady in Investigations last month. At the end of July, the Investigations Division had 26 active cases being investigated with an average of 5.0 cases per detective. They did experience an increase in thefts from vehicles between our jurisdiction and the Town of Pittsboro. The joint efforts of officers and detectives of both agencies resulted in two juvenile and two adult arrests. Detective Klayer and Detective Fults were able to recover some of the property stolen. There are further leads to investigate. Charges were filed on Amanda Oswald and Tyler Watkins, both adults, for credit card fraud and receiving stolen property that occurred at 337 S. Green Street. Detective Fults also attended a symposium at Fishers Police Department on retail theft.



Lieutenant Campbell filed theft charges on one adult for shoplifting at Specks Pet Supply. Charges were filed on two juveniles involved in receiving stolen property from 13 Murphy Circle. The department did recover two flat screen televisions that were taken from the residence.

Detective Gill filed criminal charges for credit card fraud involving one adult. The offense occurred at the Marsh store on E. Main St. Sergeant Jennifer Pyatt made one adult charge of B misdemeanor battery. She is still actively investigating several ICAC cases with members of the task force; and along with task force members will begin to serve search warrants on these active cases around the first of August.

The issue in regards to cases being reassigned back to the officers in operations has been corrected and a 70% decrease has been noted. At the same time, the Investigations case load has increased, as expected and preferred.



### **Records & Accreditation**

Records personnel recently focused attention on creating an electronic employment pre-application using Lincware/Laserfiche to be made available on the website once the recruitment effort commences on August 1<sup>st</sup>. Pre-applications will be completed on-line and automatically processed into the Laserfiche repository. While hand-written applications will still be accepted, this method will be advertised as the preferred. This project appears to be operational and should be quite successful.

Kim Shupert completed her certificate program in Leadership through I.U.P.U.I. on July 28<sup>th</sup> by attending her final required course. She and other Records employees continue to work towards their Microsoft Office program certificate and plan to finish in the spring.

During the week of July 25<sup>th</sup>, Brenda Habermehl traveled to Cincinnati, OH to attend the full CALEA conference and received a significant amount of training in the

accreditation program, specific to managing it. Later in the week, Kimberly Shupert, Chief Dove and Commissioners Bolante and Kotarski attended the CALEA candidate agency review and awards banquet. The department is exceedingly proud to report an excellent review, re-accreditation status for 3 more years and the honors of receiving both the Meritorious Award and the Award of Excellence (previously referred to as the Flagship Award). The latter award was a very lofty objective but has been a very specific goal of achievement for Manager Kimberly Shupert during the nearly seven years she has been administrating the accreditation process.

In addition to continued work with Lincware/Laserfiche, records personnel will be very busy administrating the upcoming recruitment process. Brenda Habermehl has been designated as the project coordinator during Kim Shupert's leave of absence during the upcoming months.

**Community Relations**

Sergeant Fleck prepared for the Night Out Against Crime and also his new Kids Self-Defense Class last month. Per a request from the Operations Division, the assignment of personnel to court security each Wednesday was re-evaluated. It was decided that since this is primarily a Support Division function that it would take full responsible for staffing it. Sgt. Fleck will continue to oversee the court and will use Corporal Klayer and Lieutenant Campbell for the additional positions when needed. He has also been directed to evaluate the current policy and work with Kim Shupert to possibly develop a better method and use of man hours.

**Public Information**


The department had three media contacts during the month of July. The contacts covered the I-massage search warrant and arrest and a press release seeking assistance from the public to identify a suspect and vehicles involved in theft from vehicles. The department also released eight Facebook posts, four tweets on its Twitter Page and four e-notifies from the website. ## Purchasing

As of July 6th, the department has expended 56.26% of its budget and is slightly under budget. The project of creating an additional office in the police department's lobby for probation has been completed and payment has been made. This allows us the ability to leave our Community Relations officer, Sergeant Fleck, in the lobby where has more opportunity for exposure to citizens on a daily basis.



Purchasing Agent, Chris Wingler, is preparing to attend two classes in the upcoming months. One is the Fleet and Police Equipment Expo, which will help with providing vendor information to the product committee and comparing what the department is currently using. The second is a class designed to help spend money more wisely and obtain competitive pricing from our vendors. Both of these classes should be beneficial.

## Information Technology

To address the lack of communication with the Information Technology department, meetings have been held with Assistant Town Manager, Grant Kleinhertz. An agreement has been reached that a committee would be the best approach to handling any IT issues. The initial plan appears to be that both Grant and I, Major Depinet, will be co-chairs of a committee that involves several other employees from the major sections of the town that may need to be involved with the operations of IT. The department looks forward to a more active role in Information Technology and believes it will eliminate confusion while addressing everyone's best interests and needs.

The department has recently launched several LincDoc Forms. These are the beginning approach to replacing approximately 100 PDF forms that the department is currently using on a daily basis. The LincDoc forms completely replace the need for paper and also provide an automated workflow (Chain of Command) for the purposes of reviews or approvals. All of the department's website forms are currently using LincDoc. The efficiency of the department is expected to dramatically increase with the implementation of these automated forms and savings on labor, paper, ink, printers, and copy machines will be tangible.

### **Human Resources**

The department reported no on-duty injuries last month. Corporal David Pyatt hurt his back off duty which has resulted in light duty work for a two-week period. He is currently assigned to the Operations Division researching the costs associated with the hiring of reserve officers.

The department is in the middle of the annual evaluation process and should be finished by this time next month. As stated earlier, a recruitment process has just begun for Full-time and Reserve officers. Although there are currently no full-time officer positions open, the department is planning to have a list in place if the need arises. The department hopes to hire at least five Reserve officers, the number that the department budgeted for in 2012.




## JULY 2011 OPERATIONS REPORT

The following information contained within this report summarizes information deemed pertinent for dissemination from Major Joseph Grimes, Chief of Operations.


### ENFORCEMENT:

During the Month of July, the officers of the Enforcement Division worked a total of 3723 hours, with 68 of those hours being completed by Probationary Officers currently in the Field Training Program (FTO). While 67 hours of the total hours worked were completed by Reserve Officers, and 222 hours of the total hours were worked by Interdiction Officers.

While the hours worked as indicated above might appear to be less than last month, it should be noted that the above hours directly reflect the hours worked on the road, and not the numerous hours conducted during the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Extravaganza. Numerous officers from the Reserve Division, Enforcement Division, Interdiction Unit, Bicycle Unit, and Motorcycle Unit in fact had many hours directly contributed to this event in facets of traffic control, crowd control, and criminal enforcement patrols within the area of the event and 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade. Details of officer participation and success of the Extravaganza was conveyed in the June Operations Report.

On Wednesday, July 13, 2011 in the early afternoon hours the Brownsburg AMA shift was dispatched to Arbuckle Acres, 200 N Green St, reference a suicidal male subject. HCCC advised that a subject had contacted Emergency-911 and stated that a male subject was on a bridge in Arbuckle Acres wanting to commit suicide. They were unable to obtain a name or better location

---

due to the subject disconnecting the line. Upon the arrival of the officers they were unable to locate the subject initially. All of the responding units at the time initially were thinking of the bridge that crosses over the creek that allows access to the walking paths. Officer John Maples located two subjects on the railroad trestle on the west edge of the park. As Cpl. Tony West approached, he observed Officer Maples approaching the subjects. Cpl. West immediately dismounted the motorcycle and ran up to the bridge. Officer Maples was giving commands to a female subject to walk to him. She was visibly upset and was arguing with him. Together, Officer Maples and Cpl. West were able to get her off the bridge so that they could focus on the male subject. The male subject was sitting on the edge of the bridge and had a rope tied around his neck, which was then tethered to a wire cable on the bridge. Officer Maples and Cpl West slowly approached the subject and were able to grab him by both arms. The subject, later identified as Trevor Black, resisted the rescue attempt and attempted to throw himself off the bridge. Once Officer Maples and Cpl West had the subject restrained Officer Chris Reed approached and cut the rope away from the bridge. All three officers then took Black into custody and carried him off the bridge. Officer Bowman had worked his way to the bottom of the bridge and was standing by in case the subject had fallen in order to be there to immediately start life saving rescue operations. Once off the bridge Black was put into the back of an ambulance. Officer Jeremiah Bloss followed the ambulance to the St. Vincent's Stress Center where he was committed for a psychological evaluation. These officer's put their own lives at risk by walking out onto this bridge which is quite a ways up in the air. They were able to save a life of a young man that was obviously in distress and didn't care if he took the life of an officer in the rescue attempt. This type of work shows the dedication of the officers to the community they serve. How many people would risk there own life to save the life of somebody they don't know or even somebody that wants to die? This event could have been very tragic if it wasn't for the professionalism and courage that was displayed by these officers on this day. Major Joseph Grimes will be submitting a letter for Chief Michael Dove's review for determination on possible Commendations or Awards that would be appropriate based upon each individual officers acts during this incident.

On Thursday, July 14, 2011, personnel attended a block party at 761 Pine Ridge Way hosted by Channel 13 and Outback Steakhouse for support of neighbors that provided assistance to a cancer survivor. Each of the officers in attendance represented the Town of Brownsburg and Brownsburg Police Department in very positive manner. The cancer survivor, his family, and all the citizens in attendance were thankful for the presence of the law enforcement personnel. This type of community service and interaction is vital to the networking and public image law enforcement has within our community.

On Wednesday, July 20, 2011, Officers of the Brownsburg Police Department from PMA Shift assisted the Sheriffs Dept. on a domestic involving an Iraqi war veteran that suffers from PTSD, who had battered his mother. Information that was given is the suspect ran out of the house with a 12 gauge shotgun that had a round chambered. Brownsburg Officers were able to locate and detain the male until HCSD arrival on the scene.

On Tuesday, July 26, 2011, Officer Matt Morgan arrested a suspect on a traffic stop for possession of a controlled substance/dealing. Subject was wanted for questioning in an armed robbery and beating that occurred in Indianapolis on the day prior. The subject is a Mixed

Martial Arts fighter (MMA) and resides at 404 Sugarbush Lane in Brownsburg. IMPD conducted an interview on the subject and will be filing charges.

**INTERDICTION:**

In July 2011, I.C.E. (Interstate Criminal Enforcement) Team Members made two significant seizures on I-74 during two separate traffic stops. The first stop resulted in the seizure of approximately 1 LB of marijuana, coming from Indianapolis, IN en route to Danville, IL. The driver was arrested for dealing and possession of marijuana, and also had 4 small children in the car with him at the time of his arrest. The second seizure was a traffic stop resulting in the seizure of over 400 prescription pills, coming from Illinois en route to Kentucky. The investigation is ongoing and is confidential at this point. The two men in the car were released at the time of the stop but are flying to Florida to meet with a doctor who fills the prescription and then the suspects fly back to Kentucky, and then drive to Illinois to fill the prescriptions. The majority of the pills were oxycodone pills, which is one of Kentucky's biggest drug problems. At the time of the stop, the passenger admitted to taking over 8 times the prescribed dosage.

Officers were also involved in two other incidents within town limits. I.C.E. Team Members were involved with successfully deterring a suicide attempt on the train trestle in Arbuckle Park, along with Uniform Road Officers. Officers were able to respond to the scene, walk out above Whitelick Creek on the trestle, and physically remove an individual that was attempting to hang himself from the bridge. On a second incident, I.C.E. Team members, along with Uniform Road Officers and E.R.T. members, responded to a barricaded subject in the Oaks of Windridge area off of CO RD 650 E. Officers were able to assist in talking the barricaded subject out of the home and detain him without incident.

During the month of July, Corporal Ben Pyatt traveled to El Paso, TX for 10 days of training, certifying him to teach for the U.S. Dept. of Transportation, the D.E.A., and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The course certified Cpl. Ben Pyatt to teach criminal interdiction in the entire U.S. and Canada. Officer Pyatt also spent time on the U.S./Mexican Border in El Paso, TX observing U.S. Customs and Border Patrol procedures, including a bus seizure involving 338 lbs of Marijuana in a false compartment attempting to enter the U.S. Cpl. Pyatt will begin assisting in training U.S. Border Patrol in November in El Paso, TX and Deming, NM.

**MOTORCYCLE:**

The Brownsburg Motorcycle Units had another successful month. Officer Dan Rooker led the way for the Motorcycle Units with traffic enforcement while Corporal Tony West was detailed to training and other events for the Month of July. The unit participated in the funeral of an officer from Terre Haute City Police Department on July 18<sup>th</sup>. They also performed several motorcycle escorts and training throughout the month. Cpl. West and Officer Rooker continue to battle

extreme temperatures that have reached a 100+ degree heat index. They remained hydrated and continued working throughout the shift by sitting under shade trees while continuing to run traffic, and taking breaks when needed. The unit continues to work extremely hard and we all are pleased with the dedication that has been displayed.

### **Traffic Complainants**

The Motorcycle Units continue to receive complainants of speeding vehicles in the areas of the detours from the construction projects. Cpl. West and Officer Rooker again continue to monitor the areas, but haven't seen much validity to these complaints. Cpl. West believes the overall problem is homeowners not used to the amount of traffic that is traveling through the neighborhoods. It's a plausible concern especially for small children that are playing in the areas so we have taken time to monitor this situation. Being visible in the areas is most often the best solution to the problem. When drivers observe Motorcycle Units stationary in an area, they tend to be more observant to their own actions. This in and of itself is a success to the unit due to the deterrent of traffic violations and level of safety this provides for the community.

### **Training**

Corporal West attended an Active Shooter Instructor School the entire first week of July. The class was instructed by Indiana Law Enforcement Academy personnel at the Brownsburg Training Facility. This certification will allow Cpl. West to instruct this subject to all officers in the State of Indiana. Cpl. West also instructed the Reserve Academy in several subjects throughout the month. On July 2<sup>nd</sup>, Cpl. West certified the persons in attendance at the Reserve Academy in S.T.O.P.S. On July 26<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup>, Cpl. West instructed at the Reserve Academy on Building Entry techniques.

### **Motorcycle Training**

The unit completed its monthly training on July 21<sup>st</sup>. This month's training was focused on the motorcycle competition that Cpl. West and Officer Rooker will be competing in on August 13<sup>th</sup> in Bloomington, Indiana. They also conducted some off road riding in Arbuckle Acres. Cpl. West and Officer Rooker rode on different surfaces and completed several exercises on those surfaces. This displayed to the rider how the motorcycle will handle in different environments. They completed figure 8's around trees in the grass, rode up and down steep hills within the park, and even purposely caused the rear end of the bike to get out of line while maintaining control of the clutch, throttle and rear brake. These exercises are all relevant to the work environment that they patrol.

**Officer Funeral**

On July 18<sup>th</sup> the Brownsburg Motorcycle Units participated in the funeral of Officer Brent Long from Terre Haute City Police Department. Corporal West was responsible for contacting multiple agencies and organizing department motorcycles to ride as a group to the detail. Cpl. West was able to organize and route 13 police motorcycles from multiple agencies around the state to the detail. The Motorcycle Units participation along with Honor Guard members and additional Operation Division personnel was a true testament to the professionalism of the Brownsburg Police Department.

**BICYCLE:**

The Brownsburg Police Department Bicycle Patrol Unit was detailed to the July 4<sup>th</sup> Park Extravaganza each evening for the duration of the event. The appearance made by the riders during this event once again proved effective in both the patrol and surveillance aspects. Riders continue to mark out on shift and ride various neighborhoods/businesses based on incident reports and crime trends.

**ERT:**

As an update to the July training agenda disclosed in the June Operations Report, members of the Brownsburg Emergency Response Team successfully completed a three day Hostage Rescue course hosted by Safariland at the Brownsburg Training Facility. In addition, ERT Medic Jerry Harder successfully completed a 40 hour Tactical Medic SWAT course hosted by Pelham Tactical during the Month of July. Both these said certification schools were a much needed and welcomed addition to the already expanding training opportunities being sought by the Brownsburg ERT.

On Thursday, July 28, 2011, Officers from PMA shift along with Capt. Pat Bullock responded to a report of attempted suicide by firearm at 6498 Southern Oak Dr. Initially the subject would not communicate with police on the scene. Capt Bullock directed all officers to set up a perimeter and kept everyone in safe positions while officers attempted to contact the subject. Cpl. Ben Pyatt arrived on scene and immediately began the functions of the on scene Negotiator. Capt Bullock also activated ERT and notified command staff via page as soon as he knew the situation warranted it. Capt Bullock kept all officers on scene up-to-date on the information that was available and directed all officers to what their individual responsibilities were, down to collecting information from neighbors and getting said information to the right people. After approx 45 minutes from the initial call, the subject gave up voluntarily and exited the residence.

Officer Laker completed his final Field Training Program DOR (Daily Observation Report) with his FTO (Field Training Officer) on July 16, 2011. Officer Laker met with Major Joseph Grimes on July 20, 2011 to finalize all documentation, and was directed in expectations upon release from the FTO Program. At the conclusion of the meeting with Major Joseph Grimes and Capt. Pat Bullock, Officer Laker was officially released from the FTO Program to solo patrol as a probationary officer. At this time, there are no officers currently in the Brownsburg Police Department Field Training Program.

**HONOR GUARD:**

On July 4, 2011, Brownsburg Police Department personnel participated in the Lions Club 4th of July Parade. Members directly contributed to the event through marching in the parade as representatives of the Brownsburg Honor Guard. Each officer performed their assigned duties professionally and we are extremely thankful for each and everyone's contribution to this special event.

On July 18, 2011, Major Joseph Grimes, Officer Kevin Huntsman, and Officer Grant Anderson represented the Brownsburg Police Department while attending a funeral for Officer Brent Long of the Terre Haute Police Dept. All three officers were sharply dressed, and showed their commitment not only to the Brownsburg Police Department and Brownsburg Honor Guard, but

also to all brothers and sisters who wear the uniform. As part of their Honor Guard commitment, they also wore their Honor Guard uniforms, despite the extreme heat that the area was experiencing on that day. Officer Anderson did exceptionally well by being present at the showing the day before, and by helping park the vehicles arriving at the grave site.

### **RESERVES:**

Cpl. David Pyatt has been communicating with Human Resources to convey information for what is needed in recruitment to fulfill Chief Dove's goal of 30 Officers in the Reserve Division by the end of 2013. This is a monumental goal that will require a lot of time and commitment to the task.

#### **Events worked in July by Reserve Officers included:**

- Prisoner Transport – weekly update
- Reserve officers assisted with the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Extravaganza
  - 6 day event carnival in the park
  - Parade on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July at 10am
  - Fireworks show and egress from the park

Major Grimes would like to express his deepest appreciation for the dedication the Reserve Officers of the Brownsburg Police Department exhibited during the Month of July. Without these officers, the events conducted during the Month of June and July would have been much harder in order to achieve a successful outcome.

### **TRAINING:**

During the Month of July, several training details were conducted utilizing the Brownsburg Police Training Facility. On July 5, 6, and 7 the Training Facility hosted the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy Staff and several other agencies for their Active Shooter Instructor Certification. Brownsburg Police Department had two officers attend and receive certification in this needed area. July 11, 12, and 13 the Brownsburg Police Department hosted Safariland Training Group at the Training Facility. Both instructors were flown in from out of state and provided instruction in the area of Hostage Rescue. Brownsburg ERT was able to attend and received some of the most productive Hostage Rescue training available in the nation. Several other outside agencies attended as well including HCSD, Gary PD, and Detroit PD. On July 16<sup>th</sup> the Brownsburg Junior Football League were permitted to utilize the large classroom for their annual draft selection. The BJFL wanted to express their sincere thanks to Brownsburg Police for permitting them to meet in the Training Facility. July 18<sup>th</sup> the Plainfield ERT utilized the shoothouse for its' monthly training. On July 19<sup>th</sup> the Central Indiana Law Enforcement Training Counsel (CILETC) conducted its' monthly training meeting at the Training Facility. On July 25-27 Brownsburg Police officers participated in a driving simulator funded entirely by local municipality insurance carriers. This training provided reaction based drivers training for participants in a controlled atmosphere. This training will be in addition to the required state mandated EVO training in November. July 27<sup>th</sup> the US Office of Inspector General (US OIG) utilized the Brownsburg Police indoor range for some of its annual qualifications. This generated revenue of \$200. Also on July 27<sup>th</sup>, the Training Facility played host to several K9

Teams from around the area for their monthly narcotic detection training. Finally, the 2011 Brownsburg Police Department Reserve Academy continues to be conducted each Tuesday and Thursday evening and every other Saturday at the Training Facility. No recruits have been lost throughout the Month of July. Currently 11 recruits from 5 agencies are actively participating in the Reserve Academy.


